



Dear Parents,

I hope that you read the parent letter that you received at the first class. If for some reason you did not receive a copy, you can find it on the website at www.stgilbert.org. Remember that if you did not attend the Parent Meeting, you need to read your handbook and return the Marketing Permission Slip and the white Student form to your child's catechist.

Please note the traffic pattern in effect for the West parking lot. Everyone enters off Rt. 120 and exits to the back, (south) to Wicks Street. Gary and Joe are in the parking lot directing traffic. It is important to ensure the safety of all the children and families attending Mass and REP classes. If you are dropping off a student, you are to stop by door #2. You are asked not to drop the students off at any other entrance. The one exception is the students in Grades 7-9. These students are always to use the entrance to the Junior High Building (#13). Please come early because parking can be a challenge. Catechists must begin class on time in order to complete all the material in their lessons each week.



There is a class schedule on the inside of your child's folder. We expect the students to attend every class unless they are sick. If they are sick, call the office (847-223-3071) and give the Program, the student's name and grade level and the reason for the absence.



Those families who have not paid their tuition and fees in full by next week are automatically put on a payment program. Every month, Lisa P. will email you the amount due for the month. You can pay on givecentral or put the check or money in an envelope and give to the Catechist or directly to the RE office. If you have any questions, call the office. If you wish to donate money toward those who are unable to pay, please put the money in an envelope marked TUITION ASSISTANCE and hand it in to the office. For the past years, the Archdiocese has asked us to educate the students about the "Lures" that are used by people to guide children into dangerous situations. It is called the Child Lures Program. The Catechist explains that sometimes strangers are nice people who have a smile on their face and may even give you a gift (candy, etc.). The Lures that are discussed in each grade level are age-appropriate. If, for some reason, you do not want your child to participate in this program, you need to come to the Religious Education Office and sign a form to that effect. Please do so as soon as possible.

Throughout Scripture, there are references to angels with various duties serving as messengers and intercessors. **On October 2, we celebrate the feast of Guardian Angels** – those angels who carried out God’s will in their specific duties as guardians. For example, all of Israel, as God’s people, had a guardian angel (Exodus 23:20-23), and God told Moses that an angel would go before him on the journey from slavery to freedom (Exodus 32:34). Psalm 91, a beloved prayer, says that God commands his angels to protect us wherever we go: “They will carry you in their arms, and you won’t hurt your feet on the stones. You will overpower the strongest lions and the deadliest snakes.” (Psalm 91:11-13). This is a perfect psalm to build children’s trust in God and guardian angels.

Guardian Angels in Tradition

The Catechism of the Catholic Church states, “Beside each believer stands an angel as protector and shepherd leading him to life.” (n.336) Both Eastern and Western churches believe that guardian angels protect the mind and body. They present prayers on behalf of those they protect and they offer guidance from God.
